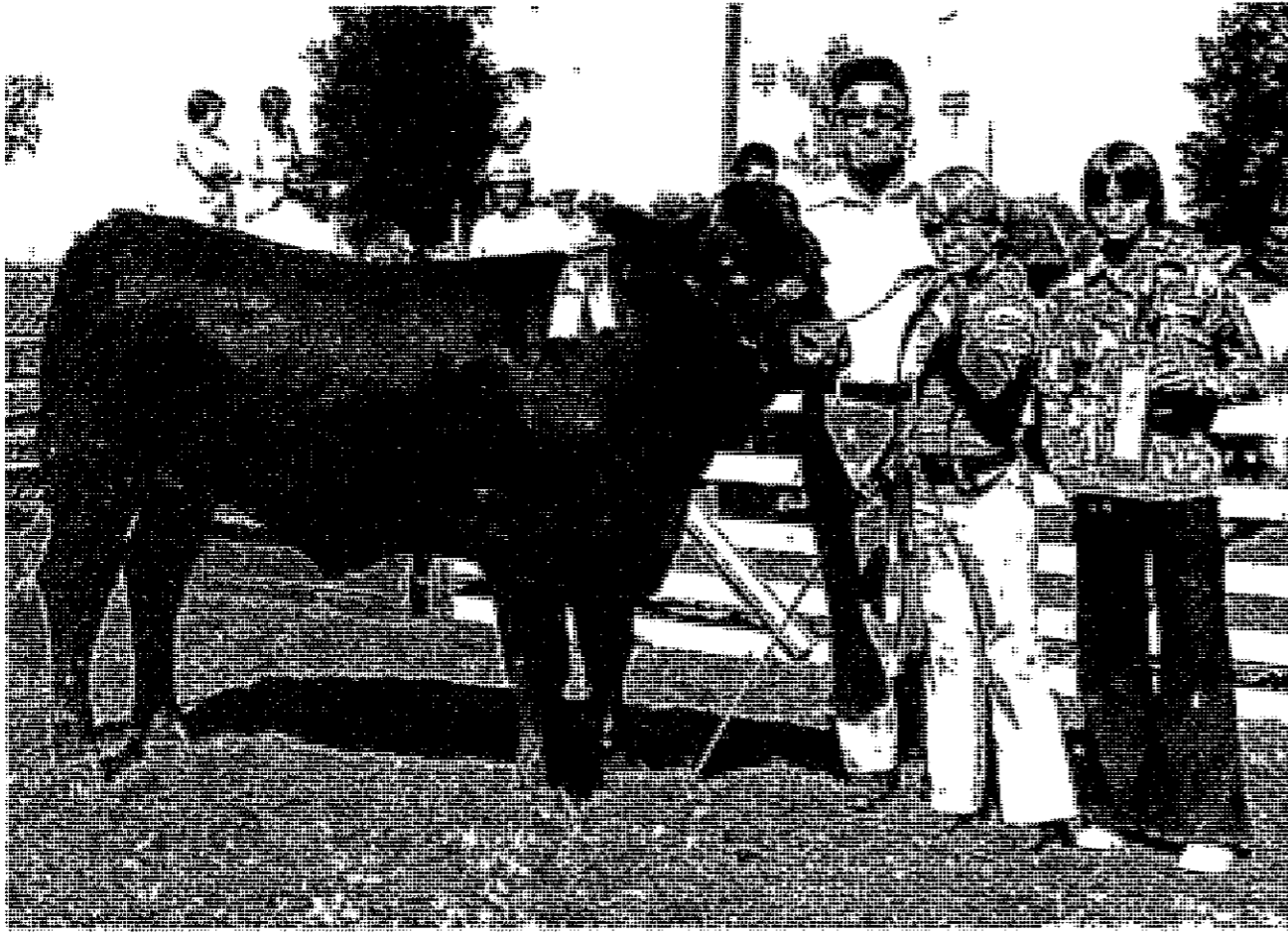

Result of millage defeat

Dewitt Twp faces deficit budget

DeWitt Township may be facing a possible deficit of \$149,090 in the fiscal year of 1977 and board members are stymied on how to correct the situation.

Township supervisor, Dale S. Emerson, told the board at Monday night's meeting that the possible deficit is directly related to the defeat of two and a half mills asked for at the August primary. "I don't know what a crisis in government is suppose to be, but this must be it," Emerson said "while informing the board of its monetary problems.

According to Emerson he sees two possible alternatives; one is to have a drain levy (which can be spread out by the township on the assessment roll) or return to a collection fee which was dropped in 1974.

As Emerson explained it, during 1977 as the proposed budget presently stands there will be no money for the roads, parks, or the cemetery. "That means if there is a hole in the road, it will stay there, grass in the parks will go uncut and weeds will grow in the cemetery," he said. "The situation is critical as far as I'm concerned."

Emerson showed the Board three sets of charts breaking down the costs, and showing where the major deficits will occur. In his report, he said that there would be an approximate 50 per cent decrease in the work force because of the deficit.

For 1976 DeWitt Township will have a deficit of \$11,536.

The supervisor pointed out that because the millage was defeated there will also be a big loss in state shared revenue.

Board members commented that they felt it should eliminate pay for committee members which would result in an approximate \$8,000 saving. No action was taken on the suggestion pending a poll of committee members.

In light of the budget crisis Jack Kzeki, a trustee, told the board earlier that there will no longer be transportation meetings, unless a need arises.

Because the proposed increased millage was defeated the board said that for the coming year they would not be able to maintain the current level of service they had previously given to the township.

"Maybe the people of the township

will see what might happen because of that action (millage defeat)," Emerson said.

The board was in quandary and had no immediate ideas or plans on how to correct the township's budgetary problems.

After discussing the budget crisis the board voted to purchase two new police cars. The old cars have in excess of 60,000 miles and according to police chief, Bill Nash, the cars were beginning to demand repairs.

In spite of it's new budget problems the board felt it would end up "paying more in repairs on the cars if they waited."

One board member said that they couldn't really cut back on equipment, but they would have to make cuts in

operational procedures such as time spent patrolling the township, mileage, gas, and labor.

In other matters discussed by the board it was voted to approve a "mutual assistance agreement." The agreement spells out the responsibilities of police jurisdiction. In the past according to Nash, there have been no problems with mutual assistance with other police agencies.

"However, with increased crime rate, it is ideal to have a written agreement," he said. "We have more to gain, than to lose."

The township board rejected an offer to join the Tri-County membership due to lack of funds. It did decide, however to join the organization if funds did become available.

counter proposals which have been totally rejected or tabled by the board. Counter proposals offered by the board have been presented on a take it or leave it basis.

"Therefore," the news release concluded, "the outlook for a contract settlement by the beginning of school is extremely remote. The teachers remain willing to negotiate."

St. Johns Superintendent Dr. Donald Burns agrees it is doubtful an agreement will be reached by the time school opens. He said, "We're not moving as fast as we would like and, naturally, there is impatience."

Responding to statements in the St. Johns Education Association news release, Dr. Burns said several of the proposals that have not been agreed upon deal with technical wording.

He cited as an instance the board's desire to add a paragraph to the portion of the contract concerning agency shop in the school system.

Although teachers are not required to belong to the local teachers' association, the amount of the dues must be paid to the association.

It is the board's wish to add a paragraph stating the board will be held harmless if court action arises from teachers dismissed for not joining the association or not paying dues equivalent to the association.

Discussing proposals offered by the board, Dr. Burns said there is only one major difference put on the table this year. That proposal would require teachers to report to school for in-service duty on those days when school is cancelled due to inclement weather.

Dr. Burns said the proposal is not being pushed.

Regarding the reference to proposals being presented on a "take it or leave it basis," Dr. Burns said those are proposals for which the board had already made major concessions. They were then offered to the teachers to be accepted with the concessions or go back to the original proposal.

Dr. Burns said the associations original salary schedule proposal, in his and board's opinion, "is way out of line."

He said the first salary proposal would cost about three times as much money as the school has to work with.

"Our proposal," Dr. Burns said, "would be a slight increase in salary and a slight decrease in extra-curricular duties." Those duties include coaching and other similar extra-hours activities.

However, he said, the negotiation team knows the board intends to increase salaries and fringes.

Another item in the negotiations not agreed upon is the insurance carrier. The board would like to change carriers from the Michigan Education Special Services Association to Blue Cross-Blue Shield. Dr. Burns said changing carriers would decrease insurance costs by \$400 per teacher in some instances.

He said the board and the St. Johns Education Association do not agree on the quality of coverage. He said the board feels, while the association disagrees, that the coverage would be the same if carriers were changed.

Although it has not been agreed this year, in the past teachers have worked under the previous year's contract if a settlement has not been reached by the time school opens.

Millage proposal loses in Bath, passes in Pewamo-Westphalia

Pewamo-Westphalia School District will be able to continue operating the same programs they have in the past because voters approved 18.5 mills asked for operating purposes.

According to superintendent Roy Thelen, the millage passed by 60 votes, 307 yes and 247 against, with one spoiled ballot.

Voters originally defeated the millage request in June.

Bath School District voters, on the other hand, defeated its millage proposal for three additional mills by 29 votes.

The district for an increase from the 18 mills they have had for the past 5 years to 21 mills.

The votes was 339 no and 310 yes. Superintendent Jim Hixon said the school board has two options when it was to meet Tuesday night.

One is to go to the electorate again in November or to go ahead with necessary cuts in personnel and services.

Hixon said the cuts would be for approximately \$80,000.

Back to school time for St. Johns students

St. Johns Public Schools will be in session beginning Wednesday, Sept. 8. Teachers will begin on Tuesday, Sept. 7.

The students will be in school a full day, with the exception of kindergarten students. They will be on a special schedule for the first two weeks. Parents have been notified by mail as to their child's schedule.

The junior high school has a new program this year, an orientation day Thursday, Sept. 2.

Students whose names begin with A - L will be in session 9-11 a.m. and M-Z, 1-

3 p.m. They will receive their locker assignments and schedule cards and also given a tour of the building.

Those unable to attend will come on Sept. 8 and will receive their lockers and schedules at that time. Buses will not run Sept. 2.

Parents who have not enrolled their children are urged to do so immediately.

The county shared time vocational program will not be in session until Thursday, Sept. 9. Students enrolled in the program should report to their home school as regularly scheduled.

"We also feel that our countywide sports coverage needs a boost, and this new arrangement should add considerably in that respect, too."

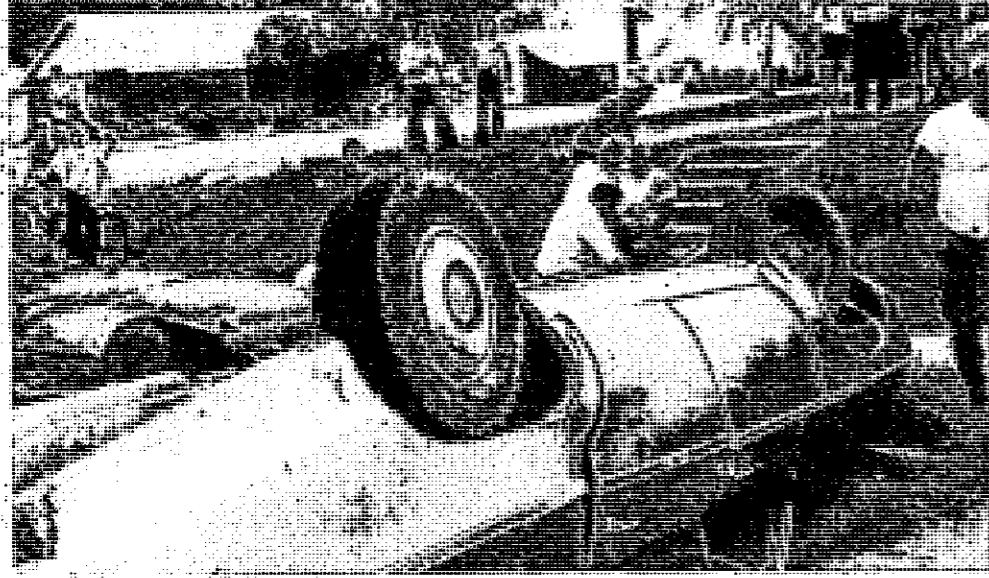

City ponders Federal-Mogul rate request

ST. JOHNS - Federal-Mogul Corp. believes they can cut their water usage in their St. Johns plant by 70 percent, but it gives them matter for concern.

That concern is whether or not the city will raise the industrial water rates to offset the loss of revenue resulting from the decreased water usage. For that reason, they have asked for a commitment from the City Commission that industrial water rates will not be raised except in a uniform increase, if needed, was established for the entire city.

Not certain whether such a commitment may be made by the city, the commission has discussed how to handle

the situation at their last two meetings.

In Monday night's meeting, Commr. Don Roesner moved to have the city attorney study the matter and to write a letter to Federal-Mogul.

The motion failed with Roesner and Gerald Wilcox voting yes while Mayor Roy Ebert and John Hamah voted against the motion.

Ebert then moved that the city not increase industrial pumping rates for five years.

Hannah tried to comment, but Ebert interrupted, asking three times if there was a second to the motion. There was no second and the motion failed.

No further action was taken.

Monthly hearings will be held before the Michigan Public Service Commission for the purpose of considering authorization to permit Consumers Power Company to reflect in monthly billings to its customers charges or credits for changes in appropriate items of expense associated with purchased and net interchange power from a base cost included in previously approved rate levels.

A hearing will be held on September 10, 1976 at 9:30 AM in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan to consider inclusion of a proposed purchased and net interchange power adjustment charge of minus .38 mills per kilowatt-hour to be applied to bills rendered to Consumers Power Company customers in the October 1976 billing period.

The hearing shall be for the purpose of determining the amount of purchased and interchange power expense incurred during the calendar month of July 1976 and the reasons therefor. Details of the calculation of the proposed adjustment will be presented along with a summary of net system kilowatt-hour requirements including details of the various types of purchased and interchange power transactions and circumstances necessitating any outages of installed capacity for a period exceeding ninety (90) days. This information will

be available on and after August 31, 1976 for examination and inspection at the offices of the Commission Secretary, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 and at the offices of the Executive Director of Rates, Research and Data Control of Consumers Power Company, 212 W. Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201.

The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested adjustment, in whole or in part, and may grant a lesser or greater adjustment than that requested. Interested parties may intervene by placing an appearance on the record at the hearing.

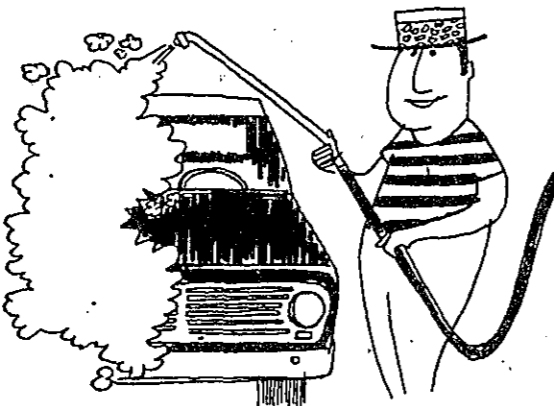

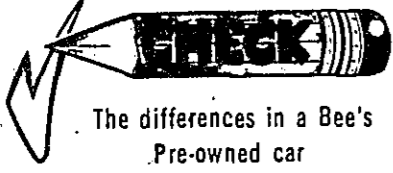

I couldn't believe what I was reading.

General Telephone is now marketing a Mickey Mouse phone.

Which reminds me of some words I wrote several years ago in Gratiot County.

After fighting numerous exasperating battles with the telephone, tongue in cheek, I began my own telephone company - the Jim Edwards Ball 'O String and Tin Can Telephone Company. The life of the company was short - we were forced to cease operations when we were unable to keep up with the demand.

However, in the interest of public service, the time may have come once again to offer the public an alternative communications company.

Service will begin as soon as 1,000 miles of string are obtained along with 100,000 discarded tin cans. That is where the public may help us and save money at the same time.

If you furnish your own tin can, 50 cents will be deducted from the installation fee.

When calling long distance, just yell louder - as most folks do now.

Of course, there will be direct dialing; merely pick up the can and yell, "Hay, Aunt Kumquat, pick up your

can, I-wanna talk to you." There is no dialing involved so you will not become fatigued by dialing 12 times in an attempt to complete just one call.

There also will be a variety of services available, like our free geography lesson. Included with each month's billing, will be calls to two or three towns you did not make. It may be irritating, but it gives you the opportunity to learn how many different towns there are in Michigan or, China and Cuba.

Need more than one can in the house to meet the communication needs of your family?

For the daughter, we offer an attractive pink princess can she can hang on her bedroom wall.

Adding new phones is quite simple. Simply tie a piece of strong string to the main hook-up running through the kitchen window. Run that string to the bedroom, poke a hole in the can, run the string through, tie a knot in the end and, presto, you've got an extension can.

We also offer a personalized billing service. At the end of the month, after you receive the bill, put your payment in the can set it on the back steps and we'll send a man to collect.

We do expect some troubles in the early days of operation.

There may be some difficulty in placing long distance calls. Because of our "just yell louder instead of dialing over and over and over" policy, it is necessary to obtain some family background from each communication can user, like someone who is hard of hearing.

In such cases, we stratch the string and put a small battery charge in the can. The listener should be able to hear the call clearly, but, if not, he or she will certainly get a charge out of having you call.

Another familiar service will be several brightly decorated can booths located throughout the area.

For operator assistance in making calls from a can booth, it is not necessary to use coins; merely give the string a brisk jerk and an operator will be instantly, if somewhat painfully, at your service.

All in all, we feel the Jim Edwards Ball 'O String and Tin Can Telephone Company offers an attractive alternative to present service at a lower price.

You'll be hearing more about us in our upcoming promotion campaign. Current songs being considered to relay our message are "String Along With Me" and "Pick Up Your Can And Call Me."

Yosemite Valley is the most famous and beautiful canyon in California's Sierra Nevada. The park is widely known for its majestic granite cliffs and tumbling waterfalls. It contains nearly 1200 square miles and ranges in altitude from less than 2000 feet to over 13,000 feet. Yosemite Valley is seven miles long and less than a mile wide or deep.

In this valley they saw the Yosemite Lodge, Curry Village and Ahwahnee Hotel. Attractions were the Cathedral Peak rising nearly 11,000 feet and is symmetrical and suggests the shape of a great cathedral, complete with roof, gable, spire and ornamental pinnacles.

Tuolumne Meadows has an elevation of 8500 ft. to 9000 and is famous for the sparkling air, wildflowers, quietness and spaciousness. Merced Grove of Big Trees and Tuolumne Grove of Big Trees are located in Crane Flat area and well known for the sequoias measuring from 45 to 90 to 114 feet in circumference at the ground and bark measuring up to 20 inches in thickness.

In Mariposa Grove of Big Trees is the "Grizzly Giant" eldest tree in the

grove and is estimated to be 2000 years old and still growing. A striking feature of the Yosemite Falls is the Upper Falls with a sheer drop of 1430 feet and after the first plunge it reaches the top of the Lower Falls and plunges to the base 400 feet more. The swaying motion of the falls because of the wind pressure, and the dry weather, there was very little water coming down the falls.

They also saw the Three Brothers which towered 4000 feet above the valley and are a triple group of rocks which rise in steps, one back of the other. The tallest of the three is known as "Eagle Peak". The Indian name of these peaks is "Pom-pom-pa-sa" which signifies three mountains playing leapfrog.

Half Dome, another granite dome rises 8842 ft. and dominates the Upper end of Yosemite Valley. El Capitan, believed to be the largest single block of exposed granite in the world, rises 3800 ft. from the floor of the Valley and directly above Merced River.

Bridalveil Fall of "pohomo" as the Indians called it has a 620-foot fall, formed by Bridalveil Creek constantly changing in appearance. In the afternoon, the mist from the fall causes magnificent rainbow hues from the sun's rays.

Mrs. Wilson said there were many more places of interest and during the

summer months they had to ride the bus.

On their last Saturday, they visited the following places of interest in the Inyo National Forest: Minaret Vista which is near Mammoth Ski area and had a magnificent view of the rugged peaks of the Ritter Range; in the canyon below winds the middle fork of the San Joaquin River; Earthquake Fault the best known of many features within the Mammoth area, not a true fault, but a fissure; and a trail that leads into the natural crack in the earth's surface, snow-filled and cool even in mid-summer.

One of the most interesting sights they enjoyed was the Devil's Postpile, located 14 miles from Mammoth Center and the last eight miles very rough narrow and winding the only way, in or out. This natural formation was the result of lava which poured through Mammoth Pass. As the lava cooled, it solidified and cracked to form 3 to 7 sided columns 40 to 60 ft. high. Glaciers later exposed and polished these posts of basaltic rock. This geologic feature is preserved as the Devil's Postpile National Monument.

Rainbow Falls is a mile walk from Red Meadows. The San Joaquin River plunges 140 feet over a lava ledge into a deep gorge. Rainbow colors in the mist are usually best during midday.

Discrimination nears its limits

One of the lesser known candidates for President this year is Mrs. Margaret Wright of Los Angeles, and after reading about her nomination by the People's Party, I certainly hope she stays that way.

The People's Party, according to the news accounts, got started in the Los Angeles area stemming from the Watts tragedies. Mrs. Wright, 54, is a grandmother, which may turn out to be her most outstanding qualification for the office of President.

As a tipoff to her campaign, it should be noted that her vice presidential running mate is Dr. Benjamin Spock, who did just fine writing books about how to bring up children, but got sort of fouled up when he switched to politics.

Mrs. Wright, in her acceptance speech, offered these comments, as quoted by the national news services:

"I've been discriminated against because I'm a woman, because I'm black, because I'm poor, because I'm fat, because I'm left handed."

She's probably right. Apparently Mrs. Wright feels that to have experienced discrimination from so many different angles somehow qualifies her to run for President.

When you stop to think about it, every one of us - in one way or another - belongs to some sort of minority group, and every one of us - in one way or another - can be exposed to discriminatory practices, just as Mrs. Wright outlines.

For example, I, too, can be subjected to discrimination and

bias for a number of reasons - in today's society, for example, because I'm white, and because I'm a man, and because I'm not poor. So far, these factors have not bothered me especially, and I'm not complaining; but just check out the feelings of some applicants for medical school, shall we say, who were rejected on a quota basis - racial, sexual, financial, or otherwise.

Mrs. Wright has it over me on the left-handed issue, and as for the fat discrimination, in my case it could be a subject at least to honest debate, and I am sympathetic.

But, there are other areas that could bring discrimination and bias in subtle ways that we don't often think so much about. For example, in studying my own plight, consider these conditions:

I'm self-employed, and bald, and Catholic, and Republican, and a home-owner. I'm married, and a father, and I'm past 40, and live in an outstate area, and I'm mainly Polish. There are other conditions - lots more - that I could list about myself, just as anyone can these days, that could under certain circumstances, foster discrimination.

Mrs. Wright obviously has had a tough row to hoe, and as long as she has the nomination of the People's Party, or some other legitimate organization, she has every right to run for President, or for anything else.

The point of this essay is simply this: It may be getting almost to the point where the "discrimination" wagon is about to break down from an overload. How far are we, as a society, going to encourage or permit the Mrs. Wrights of

today to ride the horse of discrimination, shouting their demands for equality at full voice, pursuing solely on that basis redress for every ill, either real or imagined, either actual or potential?

One of my fruitful sources for borrowing quotations is syndicated columnist George Will, a practicing conservative. Shortly after the recent Democratic national convention, Will penned these ideas on the new Democratic political unity:

"Like an Olympic-class broad jumper, the Democratic party has leapt, in just four years, from ideological extremism and procedural obscuritism to the cheerful determination that this time, by cracky, there will be no nonsense about divisive things - like ideas."

Mr. Will, by the way, is a Republican.

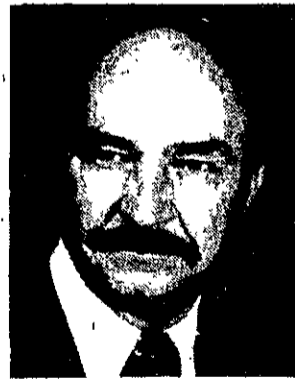
Oh? You say you thought so? Hm.

An ordinance to regulate the speed of vessels and to provide for the safe use of the waters in Victor Township, Clinton County; enacted under the authority of Act 303, Public Acts of 1967, as amended (M.S.A. 18.1287 (17)), being identical to State Administrative Rules filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

THE COUNTY OF CLINTON ORDAINS
 SECTION 1
 All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P.A. 1967, as amended, M.S.A. 18.1287 (8).

SECTION 11
 Regulation No. 19, Clinton County.
 R 281.719.1 Lake Ovid, Sleepy Hollow State Park.

1. On the waters of Lake Ovid, Section 34, T7N, R1W, and Sections 3 and 10, T6N, R1W, in Sleepy Hollow State Park Victor Township, Clinton County, it is unlawful to operate a vessel powered by a motor, except an electric motor not exceeding 3 horsepower. This rule does not apply to law enforcement officers or department of natural resources personnel pursuing their lawful duties.

SECTION 111
 All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IV
 Violations of this ordinance are a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) together with costs of prosecution or imprisonment in the county jail or such other place of detention as the court may prescribe, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or said fine, costs of prosecution, and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION V
 This ordinance and the various parts, sections, subsections, provisions, sentences and clauses are severable. If any part of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or invalid, it is declared the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected hereby.

SECTION VI
 This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its publication in the Clinton County Newspaper. Adopted by the Clinton County Board of Commissioners on the 10th day of Aug. 1976.
