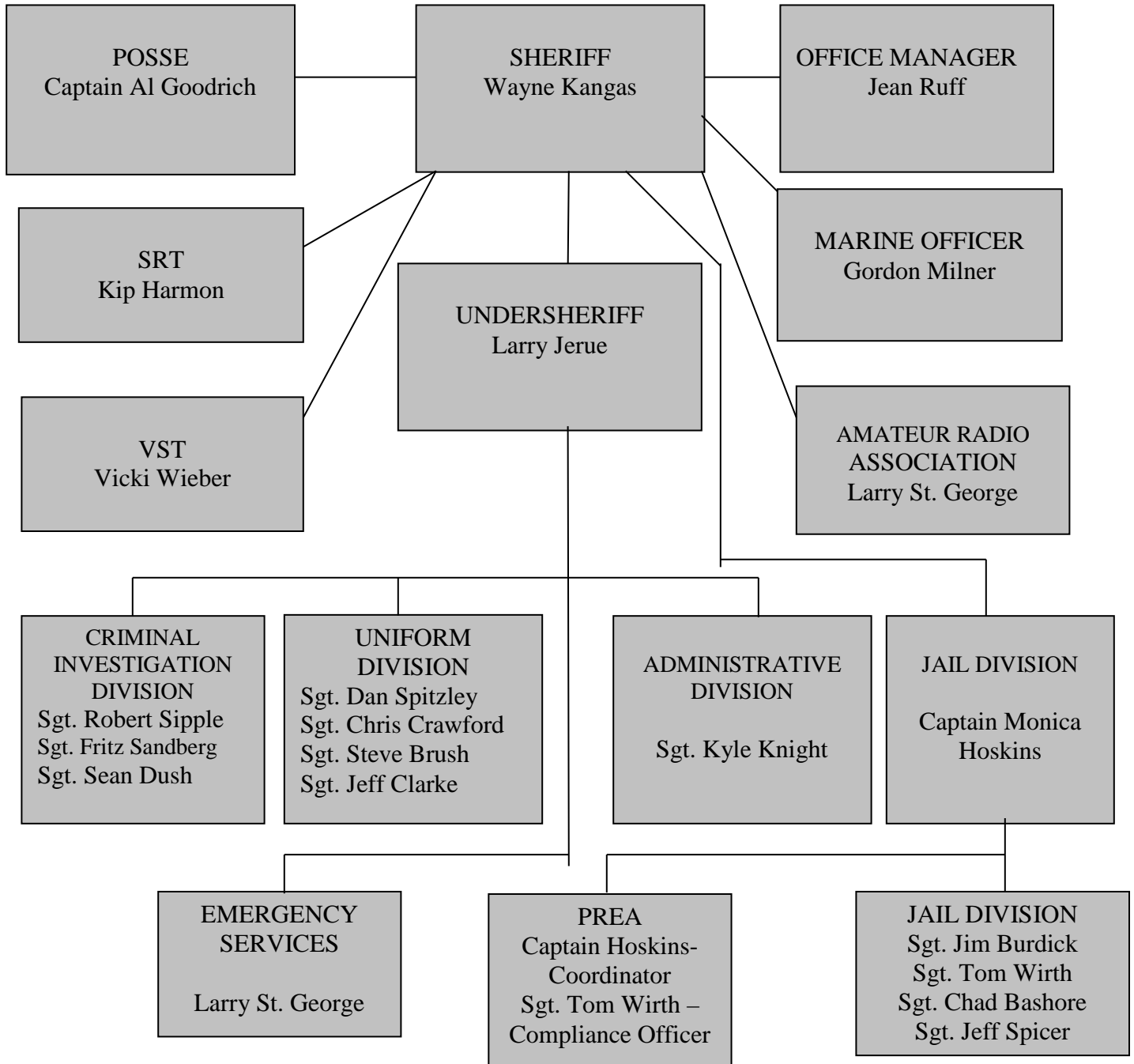

2014

- Completed a review of all positions within the Sheriff's Office to cross train personnel to meet the critical responsibilities of this office.

- Update the Jail Information Classification/COMPAS System. By enhancing this software, the Inmate Classification System will allow us to better screen inmates for housing assignments and PREA (Prison Rape Elimination Act) Compliance.
- Update the Jail door locking system and control center monitors, for emergency backup.

VICTIM SUPPORT TEAM

The Victim Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to assist Police Officers in dealing with victims to provide immediate crisis intervention in the event of sudden, unexpected death that occurs due to car crash, suicide, fire, homicide, illness, drowning, or other traumatic incidents. The Advocates strive to offer comfort, compassionate support and sympathy to the surviving family members.

Each member of the VST spent 20-hours over a weekend to learn how to lend support to the victims of violent crimes and also assist families during the initial crisis. They are available 24 hours a day to assist police agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a monthly basis and is supported by Sgt. Jeff Clarke who is the Liaison Officer from the Sheriff's Office assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation and other organizational concerns.

CRITICAL INCIDENT STRESS SUPPORT TEAM

The Critical Incident Stress Support Team is a group of dedicated volunteers trained to provide an organized system of crisis intervention among the members of Law Enforcement, Fire, EMS and other Emergency personnel. Critical Incidents include, but are not limited to, death of a child, death of a co-worker, suicide of a co-worker, victims known to the responders, multiple casualty incidents, natural disasters, and terrorism.

Each member of the CISS Team has spent over 20-hours being trained on the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) models for crisis intervention. They maintain a high level of competency through continued education and participation in debriefings. They are available 24 hours a day to assist agencies within Clinton County. The team is responsible for their program costs including trainings, cellular phones, pagers and vehicle expense. They receive minimal financial support from the County. The team meets on a bi-monthly basis and is supported by Sgt. Jeff Clarke who is the Liaison Officer, from the Sheriff’s Office, assigned to address training needs, operational evaluation, and other organizational concerns.

SHERIFF'S MOUNTED DIVISION

The Sheriff's Office Mounted Division is a group of volunteers whose members are deputized under special duty status with limited police powers and are available for call to duty at any time by the Sheriff or Undersheriff to work in varied weather conditions and diversified situations to include meetings, scheduled events, training, and emergencies. The unit operates under a 501c3 non-profit status with primary responsibility to promote the Office of the Sheriff, and support Law Enforcement efforts in Clinton County and upon request to assist our Law Enforcement mutual aid partners. The Mounted Division operates in part from monies received from the Sheriff's special projects fund and from proceeds earned at their annual Country Western Show held in October of each year.

In 2014 The Mounted Divisions 35 members were involved in over 35 events and volunteered a total of 3,438 hours of service. These hours consisted of scheduled events, training, administrative duties, and call outs to assist Law Enforcements efforts in searches and with traffic and crowd control.

The Mounted Division provides a uniform presence at local area high school football and basketball games, numerous parades and events like Special Olympics, Relay for Life, Shop with a Cop, Fill a Cop Car, and the Capital Area School Safety Picnic Event.

The Mounted Division continues to support local charities and in 2014 donated funds to the Clinton County Food Bank, Eel's Place, The Child Advocacy Center, and Forgotten Man Ministries who provide a service to many inmates at the Clinton County Jail.



Clinton County Special Rescue Team 2014 Annual Report

The Clinton County Special Rescue Team (SRT) is composed of 25 volunteer members. SRT members are trained in several disciplines including:

- Ground Search and Rescue
- Surface Water and Ice Rescue
- Large Incident Support

In January a new Command Staff structure and bylaws were put into place with the intent of making SRT a more professional organization.

The new command structure aligned more directly with the capabilities offered by SRT and allowed the Command Staff to make several improvements to procedures while also providing additional training in an effort to strengthen the current capabilities of the team.

One of the procedural improvements was the introduction of Position Task Books. These Task Books define the initial and recurrent training standards for each position and make it possible to track who is trained to complete certain tasks. The Task Books also allow for credentialing of members who complete the nationally accepted training standards we are following.

SRT responded to several requests for assistance and participated in multiple exercises throughout the county in 2014. Some of the exercises included: search and rescue, night search and rescue, search management, ice rescue, an SOT negotiator drill, and a mass casualty incident full-scale exercise.

In 2014 SRT volunteers put in more than 1300 hours during training, exercises, and responses. Countless additional hours were spent on administrative and planning tasks throughout the year.

In 2015 SRT will work to increase membership, increase awareness among county first responders, continue to implement new Position Task Books, and provide additional training and exercise opportunities to further strengthen the capabilities offered by the team.

2014 TRAINING

The Clinton County Sheriff's Office has in place a training program for all staff members to keep abreast of the changes taking place in the criminal justice field to enable them to perform their duties in meeting criminal justice standards and requirements.

Our three phase training program involves the following process:

1. **Sheriff's Office Core Training:** Training that is identified and developed using a Training Committee comprised of personnel from each division within the Sheriff's Office. An analysis of each job responsibility and duty is reviewed to identify the essential skills, knowledge and abilities required to perform their duties in an effective and efficient manner.
2. **Clinton County Law Enforcement Core Training:** Heads of each law enforcement agency in Clinton County working together to implement common training for the law enforcement officers in Clinton County. The concept to minimize training costs is met by utilizing trainers from each of the agencies to provide quality training, which is evaluated by the attendees and agency heads.
3. **Enhancement Training:** Additionally designated members of the Sheriff's Office are sent to courses that certify them as instructors on specific topics. Upon completion of their training they have the responsibility to provide instruction to other members of the Sheriff's Office in their area of expertise.

2014 ANNUAL REPORT
PROGRAM OVERVIEW

In 2014, the Office of Emergency Management continued to build and maintain the capabilities of our first responders and emergency management partners. Our office's mission is to build our county's capability to prepare for, prevent, respond to, recover from, and mitigate the effects of disasters and emergencies in our county. Citizen warning and notification, school safety planning and EOC Operations were primary areas of improvement during 2014 while working hard to maintain capabilities in our other core mission areas.

2014 Accomplishments

The Office of Emergency Management made several great strides in building capability in our county. Several new planning products have been developed and others improved and updated. Equipment has been enhanced and maintained to ensure readiness. Several training programs have been implemented for responders and exercises have been conducted to evaluate plans and training.

Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) Updates and Improvement: We continued enhancing our new EOP in 2014. EOC enhancements were made in the areas of Public Information. New Standard Operating Procedures were created to update the way that the county and its EOC partners communicate with the public and the media. Through partnerships with County Administration and Management Information Services new systems were developed to help disseminate information to the press quickly and efficiently.

Clinton County School Safety Planning: One of the Office of Emergency Management's primary missions is to help provide our school systems the tools they need to protect our children. In 2013 we began work on a comprehensive School Safety Planning Program for Clinton County Schools. This program seeks to provide step-by-step planning guidance and an Emergency Operations Plan template for area schools. The product, which will be completed in early 2015, incorporates federal guidelines, state planning guidance, and best practices into a practical format that school officials can use to engage their entire school communities. It is our goal to promote engaged, effective planning to get schools ready for emergencies rather than just creating documents.

Code RED Notification System – The Clinton County Office of Emergency Management in partnership with Central Dispatch implemented the Code RED notification system. This system provides the capability to quickly notify our residents of an emergency. The system has the capability to notify either a defined area or the entire county. Initial tests showed that the entire county can be notified in minutes. The system has already been used successfully on several occasions.

Grant Projects: Several grant projects were completed this year that contributed significantly to our capabilities. In the Law Enforcement arena, we continued our mission to provide resources to our law enforcement officers to be ready for a terrorist threat and to help them protect themselves from the hazards they face every day. Each department was provided with an Individual First Aid Kit (IFAK) which has supplies to address catastrophic trauma, bleeding, and other severe injuries. In partnership with area EMS agencies, an emergency room physician, and our Special Operations Team; we provided a train-the-trainer class for representatives from each Law Enforcement agency using the

principles of Tactical Combat Casualty Care (TCCC) so they can train their officers to effectively care for themselves and other responders in an emergency. The IFAK kits and TCCC training are very similar to those provided to US Military personnel.

New and Increasing Challenges for 2015

2015 brings several new challenges and burdens for the Office of Emergency Management. New legislation, dwindling grant programs, increased grant administration burdens, and restrictions on grant projects have added greatly to the work required to receive the same or fewer benefits.

EMPG Work Agreement: To comply with Public Act 390 and to remain eligible for Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) funding, our office is mandated to meet the requirements outlined in our annual EMPG Work Agreement. In recent years, the trend has been towards EM programs being held to higher standards. In 2015 this trend continues with new required tasks.

Hazard Mitigation Plan: One of the cornerstones of our Emergency Management program is the Clinton County Hazard Mitigation Plan. State law demands that our county have a current FEMA and State-approved plan in place. Federal law dictates that certain disaster aid funds are contingent on our having a current, approved plan. We are currently working through revisions with our Tri-County planning partners and awaiting approval of our plan from the State of Michigan.

Equipment Maintenance: As our Special Rescue Team grows and trains more often, our equipment needs more attention. This combined with some of the equipment nearing ten years of service the amount of time and effort needed to maintain it has continued to rise.

Standard of Care: Our County is being held to an increasing standard of care for emergency management that demands that we have a program that adheres to professional emergency management standards. This increasing standard of care is evident in how the Michigan Emergency Management Act (PA 390) requirements are being enforced. Grant programs are also requiring that local EM programs adhere to professional standards. In the near future, local programs will likely be required to be national accredited by the Emergency Management Accreditation Program (EMAP). Our office has already begun to work toward that standard.

Goals for 2015

School Safety Planning – Begin to implement the new School Safety Planning Program in Clinton County schools with at least half of the districts actively engaged in planning by year's end.

Emergency Operations Center (EOC) – update Human Services and Damage Assessment annex to Emergency Operations Plan and hold at least two EOC exercises during the calendar year.

Full-Scale Exercises – Conduct two full-scale exercises to test the Strategic National Stockpile Distribution Node plan and a Search and Rescue exercise with the Special Rescue Team.

CENTRAL RECORDS

Central Records has the responsibility to respond to all requests for Administrative Services for the public. They are directly responsible for registering and processing all visitors to the confined areas of the jail. **They respond to over 50,000 incoming calls to the Sheriff's Office,** respond to requests for information, process all criminal complaints, criminal histories for other agencies, compile information in the criminal records management system, fingerprint responsibilities for all Concealed Purchase License, pre-employment and firearm inspections. They provide information on a variety of subjects to the general public and perform a critical support service to the public and the Sheriff's Office.

ANIMAL CONTROL

The Clinton County Animal Control consists of two full-time employees. Their responsibilities are investigating complaints of dogs and farm animals running at large, handling lost and found pets, investigating animal bites, and investigating animal welfare and neglect complaints. They are also responsible for monitoring and caring for the Clinton County Animal Shelter. In 2013 there were 4,925 dog licenses sold in Clinton County.

- 1,186 Complaints
- 388 Lost & Found Animals
- 108 Animal bites investigated
- 78 Citations (dog running at large or unlicensed dogs)
- 27 Kennels inspected and licensed

Listed below is the revenue for Animal Control:

- \$102,710 Dog License fees

- \$5,305 Other Fees
- 630 Animals picked up

In addition to the above statistics, the new Animal Control center is running smoothly. The facility operates efficiently, using the spacious office area and animal housing. The new building is an asset to the community of Clinton County.

UNIFORM DIVISION

The Uniform Division is responsible for providing direct law enforcement services to all county residents. They have the primary responsibility to provide traffic enforcement on all secondary county roads, in conjunction with traffic enforcement on State highways and expressways.

In addition, they respond to all emergency calls for service, provide court security, serve civil process, transport prisoners, and conduct safety education programs, along with a variety of other enforcement responsibilities.

The deputy's continue to function as one of the most effective traffic enforcement units within the State of Michigan. During the past year, deputy's issued 10,306 traffic citations. They also arrested 198 drunk drivers, issued 123 seat belt violations and 149 subjects were arrested for possessing and selling narcotics. The Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team investigated 12 crashes, 8 fatal, 4 serious injuries and assisted other agencies with 4 crashes. They also completed 26 crash data recording downloads. The Clinton County Sheriff road patrol ranks in the top five for all Sheriff's Department on a consistent basis for traffic enforcement. Over the past several years, one of our officers has been recognized as the top O.U.I.L. Enforcement Officer for Sheriff's Offices statewide.

Every Deputy has been trained in basic traffic accident investigation and we have 4 officers certified as traffic accident Re-constructionists. Additionally, the division has certified Laser Speed Measurement, Preliminary Breath Test, Firearm and Pressure Point Control Tactics Instruction. We have officers trained as Crime Scene Tech, Hostage Negotiators, Firearms Instructors, Laser Instructors, Defensive Tactics Instructors, PBT Instructors, CPR, A.E.D. Instructors, Taser, Pepper Ball Instructors, Standard Field Sobriety Testing Instructor and Simunition Instructors.

The deputies continue to operate as single person cars, allowing us to maximize our Law Enforcement efforts. The assignment of a single officer to a vehicle on night shifts is very rare in law enforcement agencies today. We are very fortunate to have a staff of highly trained officers committed to public service and who perform their responsibilities in a highly effective manner.

CASES OF NOTE FOR 2014

DETECTIVE BUREAU

The Detective Bureau investigated 280 complaints in 2014 and made 40 arrests with many of the arrested persons having multiple charges and counts. Of the 280 complaints investigated 41 were criminal sexual assault or child abuse cases, 78 were cell phone or computer cases that were analyzed by the Computer Crimes Detective for various types of crimes, 49 were Medical Examiner Death Investigations that included 4 heroin overdose deaths. The remainder of cases investigated was property crime, including business and home invasions, fraud complaints including credit card frauds, identity thefts, and counterfeit money complaints. The Detective Bureau handled an increased number of scams in 2014 that largely targeted our senior population. Most of these scams involved three specific identifiers where the victims were led to believe the scammers were either from the IRS, utility companies, or a grandchild of the victims. The mode of payment requested was usually to pay through Western Union or purchase a pre-paid VISA credit card. Most of these scams were being perpetrated by persons from outside of the United States.

The year 2014 was very busy for the cybercrime portion of the Detective Bureau. Over 86 cellular devices were analyzed along with 20 computers all tied to 78 individual complaints. Phones and cellular devices are playing an ever increasing part in criminal activity, and when processed properly can provide investigators with a wealth of valuable information to assist with solving crimes. To insure these devices are processed correctly the Detective Bureau has become certified through Accessdata Mobile Examination, Accessdata Certified Computer Examinations, Oxygen Forensic Examiner, Cellebrite Mobile forensic fundamentals, Cellebrite Logical Examiner, and Public Agency Training Council+SMART Certification for cellular technologies. Many of these examinations are in support of Road Patrol and Detective Bureau ongoing cases; however, there are an additional dozen cases that were generated from monitoring of the internet that resulted in delivery or attempted delivery of drug cases.

CASES OF NOTE FOR 2014

* The Detective Bureau investigated a criminal sexual conduct case that spanned from the mid 1990's to 2006 involving nine different victims and one offender. The incidents occurred in Shiawassee, Otsego, and Clinton Counties and the victims were all minor children at the time of the sexual assaults. The investigation spanned for several months due to the number of victims and number of interviews that were conducted. The suspect was arrested and charged with 5 counts of Criminal Sexual Conduct in the 1st degree and is awaiting sentencing and faces up to life in prison.

* The Detective Bureau assisted the Bath Township Police Department with a Homicide Investigation that involved a 19 year old MSU student who was beaten with brass knuckles, robbed and left on the side of the road to die at the East Lansing exit off I-69. Two adults and one juvenile, from Saline Michigan, were arrested and subsequently convicted in this homicide.

MARINE PATROL

The primary goals of the Marine Program is to provide boater safety for 12-16 year olds, conduct inspections of boat liveries, provide for enforcement of the Marine Safety Laws and to address the Sheriff's responsibility for the recovery of all drowned bodies as mandated by P.A. 139, 1947.

Funding for this program is through a grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Funding provides for a 75% match to provide for reimbursement for officer's wages, fringe benefits, and equipment needs, supplies and materials. Equipment for the program consists of a 14-ft. boat, trailer, and 25-hp motor and associated equipment.

Program responsibilities are assigned to a part time deputy. The Deputy is a certified Police Officer also certified as a Boating Safety Instructor by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Duties for this program are conducted during the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, with enforcement patrols concentrated on weekends and holidays.

- During the past year, 60 students were trained and certified in Boat Safety.



JAIL DIVISION

- During 2014 the Clinton County Jail booked in a total of 6,050 individuals. Of that number 5,241 were male and 809 were females.
- The average daily count for the year was 83 locals and 112 boarders, for a daily average total of 195.
- Approximately 236,885 meals were served from the kitchen
- Self-Jail Inspection was conducted and passed.
- PREA (Prisoner Rape Elimination Act) compliance standards are being applied.
- The County Jail continues to provide inmate programs to include: Religion, Substance Abuse, AA, Anger Management, Alternative Education, Life Skills, Parenting classes, and recreation.
- Fingerprints are set up to be sent electronically to the Prosecutor's Office.
- Charter Cable TV – updated entire jail to the Digital System.
- M-dorm – Tables were refurbished, instead of replaced. With the money saved from the table project, new carpeting was installed in the Control Center, 4 interview rooms, and the Jail Sergeants Office.
- Keefe Commissary Accounting Software was updated. A Kiosk has been placed in the lobby for inmate accounts/bonding. Upon release, inmates are issued a “debit card” for the balance of money left in their account.
- Affordable Health Care (Healthy MI) is now offered to sentenced inmates prior their release, through CEI Community Mental Health, Ingham/Eaton/Clinton Counties.
