DeWitt City	Curbside collection is provided weekly from April thru November. Leaf collection runs from October 1 thru November 30. Call the City for details on a Spring and Fall Brush collection, and Christmas Tree collection. Screened compost and wood chips are provided free to city residents. St. Johns City	City crews manage weekly yard waste collection April thru October. Leaf program is held from October thru December. Leaves must be bagged in biodegradable leaf bags. Drop-off compost site for leaves, yard waste, grass clippings and tree branches is located at 1030 N. US-27. Screened compost is free for city residents located at Lansing Street (north of Gibbs). Back Yard Composting	Often the best way to manage yard wastes is through back yard composting. When residents properly manage materials on their own property, it provides a variety of economic and environmental benefits. It uses less resources than bagging and placing at the curb or taking to a local collection site, avoids fuel use and pollution from collection trucks, and creates a valuable soil amendment for use on the lawn or in the garden.	The Clinton County Department of Waste Management can help residents establish back yard compost bins.
